



RABBI'S MESSAGE

õA õTanöakh Quiltö

One of the customs of Shavuot (the holiday that celebrates the giving of the Torah) is called

õTikkun Leil Shavuotö. This, traditionally, is an all might study session in which one reads sections of every book of the Hebrew Bible (the Tanakh) as well as sections from each tractate of the Talmud.

About a decade ago the URJ published a whole plethora of Tikkun Leil Shavuot materials.

In this spirit, the religious school will be working on a Tanakh Quilt. õTanakhö is the acronym for the Hebrew Bible (also called the Old Testament by the Christians). The word Tanakh is made up of three letters standing for the 3 parts of the Hebrew Bible. The *tav* is for the \pm Torahø

The *Pentateuch* or the Five books of Moses. The *nun* represents the second section, the Neviøm - the

Prophets and the Kaf (khaf) is for the Ketuvim \acute{o} the Sacred Writings.

Our Tanakh quilt will have approximately 27 foam panels for each of the major books of the Bible. Each will contain the name of the book in Hebrew and English and a picture illustrating a major narrative or theme from that book. The students can either draw their own illustrations or choose from hundreds of pictures Iøve Xeroxed from many Biblical text books. Theyøll be working on this project May 22nd, the last session of Sunday school. On Friday June 10th, when we will be celebrating Shavuot, they can add a few last minute touches during the oneg that Friday. Then at the Family Services each will come forward and explain the content of the book(s) he/she illustrated.



The Holocaust Memorial, May 1, 2011

Despite inches of rain, some hail, and dreary grey skies, on Sunday afternoon May1st in the elegant, peaceful environment of the Anthony Chapel in Garvan Gardens, children and adults of different faiths, colors, and beliefs, gathered together for the first interfaith service recognizing that each of us can contribute to peace in our own time and combat prejudices and hate in our own way.

Rabbi Jerry Fox, Congregation House of Israel, Reverend Leon Massey, Roanoke Baptist Church, Reverend Emeritus David Wilson, First United Methodist Church, Reverend C. B. Baker, St. Lukeøs Episcopal Church, and Reverend John McCallum, First Baptist Church all addressed the gathering denouncing the evils of genocide, hate and prejudice.

Reflective music was provided by Laura Rosenberg and Mara Magdalene. Carla Mouton, Moderator of the Event, Mrs. Mary Watermann, Miss Kathryn Garner, Ms. Deborah Wright, and Minister Cheryl Batts, President and Founder of PHOEBE (ôPeople Helping Others Excel by Exampleö) each participated in contributing soulsearching prayers and readings.

The Holocaust Remembrance Educational

Project and Congregation House of Israel, the sponsors of this event, express our deepest thanks to all of these individuals who contributed so much to making this first ecumenical coming together to commemorate Hope and Peace on the International Day of Remembrance of the 12 million victims of the Holocaust such a special occasion. We also thank the Sentinel-Record for contributing to the success of the event.

Serving with John Wells, Director of Garland County Library, and Joanne Reagler, who cochair this committee, were Carla Mouton, Sue Koppel, Mary Watermann, Laura Rosenberg, Patti Fleischner, and Carol Kleinman. Betty Kleinman acts as treasurer of the funds of the Holocaust Committee. The Jewish Publishing company Behrman House has been moving into the digital age quite a lot lately and their newest product is *iTorah Blessings* - good for honorees called to the bimah during the High Holidays, or for anyone who wants to learn, or simply brush up on, the blessings before and after the reading of the Torah. *iTorah Blessings* also includes the *Shehecheyanu* and the blessing of a parent for a child. You can play each word as you touch it, listen to yourself practice, or watch a video with all the details of how to have an aliyah or how to decorate the Torah.
