## Davar

*"A Matter for Discussion"*



A congregant recently told me he read the weekly Torah portion (parasha in Hebrew). The revelation gave me the chills. Why? This is a rabbi's dream fulfillment. To have Jews in his congregation who observe, study and practice their tradition. Yes, when we get all done with the

mundane concerns in life -- beginning with #1 on the list -- MONEY -- we can and should return to these three age-old pillars of Judaism, known in Hebrew as *Torah, Avodah* and *Gemilut Chasadim*.

It's nigh impossible to heed these great tenets of our faith on a daily basis. The Reform Jewish movement has never officially encouraged daily prayer (known as davening). Although Torah study has seemed to "catch on" over the last generation, the numbers who actually engage in that practice -- conducted on Saturday mornings before a Bar/Bat Mitzvah service -- usually hover around the *minyan* (a quorum of 10) level. Some congregants have expressed surprise when I insist that Saturday morning observance and study are just as important to a rabbi as Friday evening services. True, Friday night is the jewel in Reform Judaism's diadem, but I'm very happy davening on Shabbes morning with my +/- minyan and discussing the Torah portion around a *tisch* (table) afterward,

I include these Hebrew/Yiddish words not accidentally. A dear colleague of mine used to say that Judaism is Hebrew and Hebrew is Judaism. But he could have included Yiddish in the equation, which he happened to speak fluently. When we frequent a temple and sit with our rabbi all sorts of Jewish references -- historic, linguistic, sociological -- become part of our Jewish vocabulary. The more we do this together, the more "Jewish" we sound and think. Many of you visit regularly with Personal Trainers (PTs). Why not consider a regular visit with your PR, your Personal Rabbi? I love

## From the President



I hope everyone had a wonderful Thanksgiving. I am with both my children and their families in one of the most beautiful parts of the country, the Berkshire Mountains in western Mass. As I think about writing my article for the shofar, I think about how thankful I am

to have my family together. I have a thousand reasons to smile. I found the story below and wanted to share with all my temple family at this special time of year.

### *A Wonderful Thanksgiving Story*

A blind boy sat on the steps of a building with a hat by his feet. He held up a sign which said: "I am blind, please help."

There were only a few coins in the hat.

A man was walking by. He took a few coins from his pocket and dropped them into the hat. He then took the sign, turned it around, and wrote some words. He put the sign back so that everyone who walked by would see the new words.

Soon the hat began to fill up. A lot more people were giving money to the blind boy. That afternoon the man who had changed the sign came to see how things were.

The boy recognized his footsteps and asked, "Were you the one who changed my sign this morning? What did you write?"

The man said, "I only wrote the truth. I said what you said but in a different way." I wrote: "Today is a beautiful day but I cannot see it."

Both signs told people that the boy was blind. But the first sign simply said the boy was blind. The second sign told people that they were so lucky that they were not blind. Should we be surprised that the second sign was more effective?

Moral of the Story: Be thankful for what you have. Be creative. Be innovative. Think differently and positively. When life gives you a hundred reasons

## Holocaust Committee

### No Place For Hate Art Party

A gala party was held on Nov. 18 at Intermediate Park Magnet IB School to celebrate Maggie Brammer, a 6th grader there, who won the Anti-Defamation League South Central District Art Contest. Louisiana, Mississippi, and Arkansas Schools participating in “No Place For Hate” were eligible. About 100 students entered the “Imagine a World Without Hate” art contest. Maggie received this honor and her home room classmates, parents, grandparents, teachers and IB Staff enjoyed surprising Maggie with cake and balloons.

The Holocaust Remembrance Educational Project, a committee of the Congregation House of Israel, decided to try to introduce “No Place for Hate” in some of the Garland County Schools. The summer of 2014 the Park Magnet IB Elementary and Intermediate schools both decided to participate in it. Becky Rosburg, Principal, and Leslie Whalen, Counselor, of the Intermediate IB School and Diane Smith, Principal, and Renee Tester, Counselor, of the Elementary School accepted the challenge. The Anti-Defamation League, a non profit organization sponsors this program which involves all students in the school. It is based on the students recognizing to respect diversity of all and denouncing bullying, cyberbullying and discrimination. Every student signs a pledge to support the basic concepts.

Each school that participates agrees to sponsor three projects during the school year. Lindsay Baach, ADL Director, located at 3747 W. Esplanade Ave., Metairie, Louisiana, supervises the program and offers knowledge and educational assistance in carrying out the program.

The Holocaust Remembrance Project hopes to involve more schools in the Hot Springs area as the years go by.

## Jackson House

*A note from Sue Koppel*

I want to thank everyone so very much for their donations of food and contributions to Jackson House. For some reason, maybe the economy, people have not been as generous with their donations this year. Our shelves are pretty bare and I don't remember having this problem since the 1980's and early 90's.

We now have a food bank in Hot Springs, started with the help of Jackson House and run by a former board member. The food bank buys food at wholesale prices and sells it to us at 40% of what it costs them to purchase the food, so every dollar donated buys three times the amount of food it would normally cost.

Jackson House provides help with food, clothing, medicine, transportation, rent, utilities, and many other things for our clients. We had a gentleman come in last week who had just been released from Levi Psychiatric unit. He was homeless, had no money, and had been spending nights at different McDonalds restaurants or the bus station just to get out of the cold. He had a brother in Texarkana that would let him stay but didn't have the money or means to get him there. Our director took this man in her car to the bus terminal and purchased a ticket for him to go to Texarkana. That is just one example of what your donations can help with.

Thanks again to everyone for your support.

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*A note from Janie Smith, Jackson House Director*

I wanted to convey my deepest appreciation for the participation, creativity and steadfast dedication of this Congregation to give back to this community's needy. I am humbled by your good works in all that you have done and continue to do. You are the foundation upon which good works are conceived and completed.

This has been a difficult year as we have opened 100+ new cases every month. People are coming from everywhere in dire straits while the local pop-

## Yiddish Pop Star Claire Barry Dies at 94



Claire Barry, who crossed over from the world of Yiddish entertainment to global pop stardom as half of The Barry Sisters, died Monday in Aventura, Florida. She was 94.

At the height of their popularity in the 1950s and '60s, Claire and her sister Merna conquered television as regulars on the Ed Sullivan and Jack Paar shows.

Claire Barry's last performance for an audience was in 2009. "I was there," Corey Breier, a close friend of Barry's and the longtime president of the Yiddish Artists and Friends Actors Club, told the *Forward* from his home in Aventura. "She was being honored by the Footlighters' Club, which is Florida's version of Friar's club. She sang 'My Yiddishe Mama.' There wasn't a dry eye in the house. It was the last time she sang publicly."

Born in the Bronx to Yiddish-speaking immigrants from Kiev, Clara and Minnie Bagelman first performed as the Bagelman Sisters on a New York children's Yiddish radio program in the 1930s. "People told us that we had perfect harmony," Claire Barry told the Idelsohn Society for Musical Preservation, which reissued The Barry Sisters' last album, 1974's "Our Way," in 2008. "But to be honest, we didn't know what harmony meant! We had no training, no schooling in this type of thing. There is a Yiddish word *beshert*, which means 'meant to be.' I always say, it was *beshert* that we would sing like that."

According to the Idelsohn Society, the sisters made their first records in the late 1930s for RCA Victor, harmonizing over a stellar quintet that featured the John Coltrane and Miles Davis of pre-WWII Jewish music: klezmer clarinet king Dave Tarras and composer/arranger Abe Ellstein. They fol-

lowed it up with a collaboration with tenor great Seymour Rechtzeit, the ubiquitous and celebrated king of Yiddish radio.

By the 1940s, the Bagelmans — now the Barry Sisters — had become sensations through New York radio programs like "Yiddish Melodies in Swing," where they would sing jazz recordings in Yiddish. Their first full-length album, "Sing," appeared in 1954; it included Yiddish standards like "My Yiddishe Mamma" and "Romania." Their Yiddishized versions of popular tunes like "Raindrops Keep Falling on My Head" — "Trop'ns Fin Regen Oif Mein Kop" — became huge crossover hits.

The Barry Sisters "didn't look like the typical Yiddish theater stars or singers of that era," said Breier. "They looked glamorous. And they spared no expense for their orchestrations — they always had the best orchestrations possible."

In 1959, the sisters — by then international stars — toured with Ed Sullivan on a groundbreaking visit to the Soviet Union, where visits by Western performers were rare. They earned a fiercely loyal following among Russian Jews.

"In communist countries, at that time, Yiddish was banned, but their recordings were snuck in," Breier said. "There wasn't one community in the world where Yiddish was spoken where Barry Sisters' records were not played." And in 1973, they also performed for grateful Israeli troops during the Yom Kippur war.

A new generation is indeed appreciating Claire and Merna Barry's contributions to American pop culture. As the Idelsohn Society's 2008 liner notes put it:

If adapting Jewish music to the rhythms and contours of the American pop landscape can be considered one of the dominant aesthetics of early twentieth century popular music, then the Barry Sisters ought to be considered crucial bi-cultural pioneers, part of the same treasured artistic genealogy that usually starts and stops with the Tin Pan Alley likes of Irving Berlin, George Gershwin, and Harold Arlen. They didn't turn America Jewish, they made Jewish sound more American.

Merna Barry died in 1976. Claire Barry is survived by a daughter, Joy Pargman.

secular subjects, that almost all of you know. But I've studied and practiced Judaism all of my adult life. I've found, like great literature, that the insights only get deeper with each approach to the text.

Someone once said to me that the reason we continue to re-read great books is not that the words change but rather that **we change**. Judaism's rules and observances and texts have been around for millennia. But it is each generation's challenge to take them in our own hands, adding our own insights as we continue to benefit from their wisdom.

So...keep reading those texts. And don't hesitate to visit your rabbi on Saturday morning or any time, weather permitting.

## Oneg Recipes

### Cracker Pie

#### Filling

½ pt. cream  
½-¾ cup pineapple preserves (*crushed pineapple can be substituted for a little less sweet filling*)

Whip the cream. Fold in the pineapple preserves. Pour on top of chilled pie crust. Keep in refrigerator until served.

#### Crust

3 egg whites  
¼ tsp. cream of tartar  
¾-1 cup sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
½-¾ cup coarsely chopped pecans  
12-14 crushed unsalted crackers

Beat egg whites until foamy. Add cream of tartar and beat until whites begin to form peaks. Add sugar and beat until thick. Add vanilla. Fold in pecans and crackers. Pour into greased and floured glass pie plate. Bake 25-30 minutes at 325.

Optional – finely grated, moist coconut may be sprinkled over top of filling.
