ARZA Report

“On behalf of almost a million and a half American Reform Jews, I react with dismay and alarm to the recent report that Anat Hoffman, leader of Israel’s Women of the Wall, was interrogated and fingerprinted on January 6 by Jerusalem police. She was told that she may be charged with a felony for violating the rules of conduct at what many consider to be Judaism’s most sacred site. The action against Ms. Hoffman who is the Executive Director of the Israel Religious Action Center, follows on the arrest in November of Nofrat Frenkel a member of the Conservative movement and a medical student. The crime: wearing a tallit (prayer shawl) not at the Wall itself, but at an area that had been previously designated a place where Women of the Wall can gather for a once-a-month worship, as they have done for the past 21 years.

These recent actions at the Wall insult all Jewish women for they are being reminded, as they have so many times in the past, that they are second-class Jews at a place that is not a synagogue but rather, an historic site of great importance to all Jews, not just those who are Orthodox. The insults to which Women of the Wall have been subjected cannot be repeated in polite company. The fact that the police have seen fit to arrest women who went to the Wall for peaceful prayer and not those who have screamed that the Nazis should have murdered these women is a stark reminder of the lengths to which the ultra-Orthodox in Israel will go to force their religious practice on an entire nation.

One must wonder why the people of Israel tolerate a religious fanaticism that is no different than what we have witnessed in Iran and elsewhere. There have been riots on Shabbat by ultra-Orthodox Jews protesting the opening of a parking lot near the entrance to the Old City of Jerusalem. There have been riots in Jerusalem protesting the fact that an Intel plant operates on Shabbat. There are now segregated busses in Israel on more than 90 routes, with demands that the number of routes be increased. There is a growing crisis in Israeli education due to the fact that there is not a core curriculum required of every Israeli student, which means that increasingly students are being exposed to a narrow religion-based curriculum and are not learning the subjects that will allow them to function in a modern society. In short, Israel is the rare democracy today that tolerates and even worse endorses religious discrimination against Jews. The promise of Israel’s “Declaration of Independence that Israel will be a homeland for all Jews appears to be nothing more than a dream.

Make no mistake: What appears to be a growing religious crisis in Israel is as much a threat to Israel’s survival as are the external threats, perhaps more so. Israel has shown that she can protect herself from armies and terrorists. Protecting herself from religious extremism may be Israel’s biggest challenge—a challenge that cannot and must not be ignored by those who care about Israel’s soul.”

A Call to Action—Make the Wall for all Jews

On January 5th, 2010, I, Anat Hoffman, Executive Director of the Israel Religious Action Center, and leader of Women of the Wall was called in for questioning and fingerprinted by the Israeli police. They warned me that I was being investigated for the felony offense of wearing a tallit, and holding a Torah at the Western Wall.

My interrogation comes less than two months after the November 18th, 2009 arrest of the Women of the Wall member Nofrat Frankel for wearing a tallit and holding a Sefer Torah at the Wall.

We are asking you today to contact your local Israel Ambassadors and Consulates and tell them that you will not tolerate religious discrimination or be forced to practice the religious ideologies of the Ultra-Orthodox community. You can write your own letter or sign the letter we have attached. (see below)

Israel must understand that the will of a small fundamentalist minority cannot take the Wall away from Klal Yisrael.

Rabbi's Message

Tu bi-Shevat, Jewish Arbor Day, was celebrated on January 30th this year. The Jewish National Fund, for the last one hundred eight years has planted 240,000,000 trees in Israel. From outer space you can clearly see the scope of the 'green line' between Israel proper and the West Bank and Gaza. Literally, there is a visible green territory where the JNF has been planting for the last century, in Israel proper. Where the majority of Palestinian areas are located the land appears tan or buff in color. The planting of trees – contributed to so generously by Diaspora Jews – has been a major thrust of the Zionist enterprise. We all know that trees give off life-giving oxygen, hold the soil from eroding, and provide fruit and nuts and a pleasant environment for people and animals.

With all this in mind, I was very surprised to read a recent article in the Jerusalem Report illustrating how several Palestinian groups are promoting the planting of trees around Palestinian villages. Their funding comes from the Palestinian Authority, donors in Europe, American and the Arab world, including Jews, and some of the saplings have been provided by the JNF!

Whereas Jews primarily plant pine forests, the Palestinians prefer fruit trees: almond, apricot and especially olive. By comparison to the JNF's gargantuan work over a century, the Palestinians are just getting started.

Of course, like everything in the ME, there are all kinds of political considerations tied in with any seemingly pure effort at ecology. While the JNF planted forests to delineate Jewish land, one of the motives of the Palestinian planters is to keep Israeli settlers from seizing open land that often surrounds West Bank villages. An 1858 Ottoman law, still actively enforced, declares land not cultivated for ten years will devolve back to the state; in this case, the state of Israel. Many of the West Bank Jewish settlements are growing and need to expand their residential areas. Uncultivated land provides an easy opportunity to legally gain control of more acres. By planting fruit trees on open land, and maintaining them for ten years, the given Palestinian village can prevent the loss of this land which they claim as their own. This tactic is infuriating some of the Jewish settlers. Their ire is especially cast on the JNF for giving saplings and some land to the Palestinians.

During all my childhood and younger years I heard over and over again that the Arabs neglected and didn't care about the land. Somehow I feel their act of planting fruit trees is within the Jewish spirit of love for the land. It will improve the land for everyone and I think it's a really good non-violent way of staking their claims. Planting olive trees, whose branches are universal symbols of peace, is surely far preferable to rockets or suicide bombers. Maybe, just maybe, this act could serve as a mutual symbol of esteem and understanding, a commonality of purpose between the two peoples.

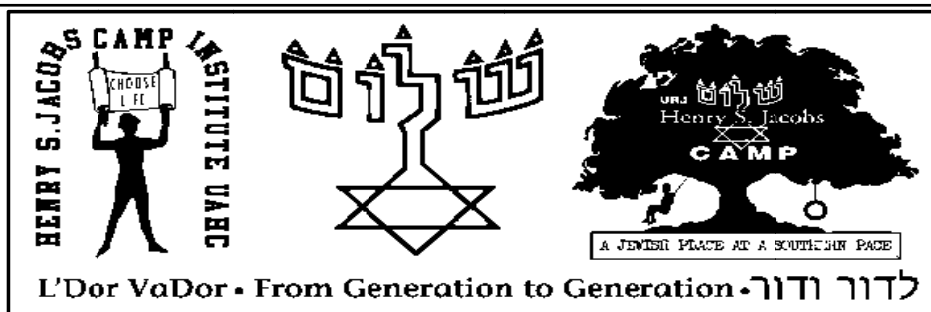

Arkansas Camper Incentive Program

The Tenenbaum Foundation and the Foundation for Jewish Camp have teamed up again this year for the Arkansas Camper Incentive Program. This statewide program is designed to encourage any Jewish child who is a first-time camper to attend any not-for-profit Jewish camp in North America.

In mid-December the Foundation for Jewish Camp online registration site will be available to applicants for the first year program. Please note that if you took part in this program last year (2009), you may apply again this year for your second year, but the grant is lower.

We are grateful to the Tenenbaum Foundation for its continuing generosity and support of Jewish families in Arkansas and modeling for our young people the importance of maintaining and contributing to our community.

The requirements are:

- 1) Residency in Arkansas (congregational affiliation is not required).
- 2) Must register for a session of at least 19 days to be eligible for a \$1,000 grant (first year only). Those campers who attended camp last year with a grant from this program are eligible for a \$750 grant for their second year.
- 3) Registration must be at a non-profit Jewish summer camp anywhere in North America. Eligible camps are listed at www.onehappycamper.org.
